



Two-Wheeled Tune-Up

Every month, volunteers from Grace Church (Orange, Calif., Mike Sciarra, pastor) erect a makeshift bike shop in the parking lot of a Mexican market and wait for community members to drop by for a repair. Bike racks and gear sit under a portable tent, and the odd two-wheeler or tire stands nearby. As volunteers work, they exchange stories with bike owners and teach them basic bike-repair skills.

"[The bike ministry] gave us the opportunity to share the love of Jesus in a practical way," said Doug Roller, associate pastor at Grace Church.

Occasionally, Grace Church members find nearly new bicycles for the ministry, which passes them on to community people in need. Roller recalled the arrival of a little boy at the shop whose bike was beyond repair. "We had just gotten a boy's bike that morning," Roller said.
